GREETINGS –As a member of the Museum Room Committee, I have recently spent some time identifying which artifacts in our collection belong to the Morgan family. We will soon select the items that best fit the story we wish to tell our visitors. From business letters and patent documents to children's stockings and travel cases, guests to the House will be able to catch a glimpse of the lives of D.S. Morgan and his family. Serendipitously, as I was preparing the object list for the room, we were offered several more family treasures:

On the walls of the 1st floor hallway, you will soon see the portraits of Samuel Kingsbury III (1805-1855) and his wife Phebe Spaulding (1809-?). They were the grandparents of Emily May Kingsbury, who married Henry Morgan, D.S. Morgan's 5th child, in 1895. These paintings came to us through Reed Sutherland, from Saratoga Springs. Emily May Morgan was the great aunt of Reed's father, David Sutherland. Mr. Sutherland had indicated in his will that he wished to see these two portraits "hanging in the Morgan-Manning House, with the hopes that the curators will relate the story of his ancestor's meeting with his wife at the canal." We are delighted to be able to fulfill this wish.

Among these treasures are a wonderful travel trunk labeled with Sara Morgan Manning's name—it is easy to imagine it being carried by porters during Sara's many trips to Europe—and a book of Common Prayer that Susan Morgan had offered to her husband Dayton for Christmas in 1867. You will get a chance to see these artifacts in the new Museum Room yourselves, as they will be included in our displays.

HOUSE TOURS THIS SUMMER – We held our last Open House Sunday on September 1. Once again, Brockport Art Festival on Sunday, August 11 was our most popular day, with approximately 200 people walking through our doors and enjoying a tour of the House's first floor. In addition to our Sunday tours, I was delighted to show the House to a few couples who briefly stopped in Brockport during their journeys on the Erie Canal. Not only do these visitors frequently share stories about the other historic houses they have visited, they also often share their knowledge of Victorian artifacts. I now can differentiate a tintype from a carte de visite. I also learned to identify a hand-made chemise, or female undergarment, from the Civil War era! I become a better historian with each visit.

SATURDAY OF SERVICE FOR THE COLLEGE OF BROCKPORT'S CLASS OF 2023 – Once again, we were fortunate to get the help of 40 students from the College at Brockport on Saturday, August 24. 2019-2020 Morgan Manning House Presentation Schedule

October 23, 2019 (Wednesday) "Happy Mole Day – Conversations on Victorian Chemistry" (Presenters: Drs. Bob LeSuer and Carly Reed) The Victorian era was rich with chemical discoveries, not least of which was the development of the iconic periodic table. In this program, we will hear from Dimitri Mendeleev, the chemist recognized as the father of periodic law, and Marie Curie, who discovered two new elements and devoted her life to the study of radioactivity, a concept wholeheartedly rejected by Mendeleev. Conversations on Victorian Chemistry is modeled after Jane Marcet's 1806 textbook, Conversations on Chemistry, which was

intended to introduce girls to the world of science, but had a much broader impact due to the interactive conversational approach used.

October 30, 2019 (Wednesday) "Changing Victorian Deathways in the 19th Century" (Presenter: Mr. Derek Maxfield & Students) The Victorians were an eccentric lot who, through the first half of the 19th century, could romanticize anything — even death. They made rules about how to die properly, insisted upon proper attire for not only observing a death but anticipating and dressing the deceased properly. They kept souvenirs of the dead to remember their loved ones. But after the Civil War the Victorians changes and the way they treated death changed as the Civil War, Industrial Revolution and Consumer Revolution molded their sensibilities.

NB: On **October 28 and 29**, the Morgan Manning House will be open in the evening, as we will have an **exhibition on Victorian Deathways on display in the Red Reception room**. This exhibition will be curated by GCC students.

November 19, 2019 (Tuesday) "Happy 200th Birthday, Dayton Morgan" (Presenter: Dr. Rozenn Bailleul-LeSuer) This year marks the 200th anniversary of Dayton S. Morgan's birth. Originally from the nearby town of Ogden, D. S. Morgan settled and flourished as a businessman in Brockport. While his business ventures required him to travel extensively, the letters he sent to his family and business partners at the D.S. Morgan and Co. plant in Brockport present him as a caring father and a man conscious of his civic duties in the village. This program will present the many facets of this self-made man known as "one of Brockport's leading citizens."

<u>December 18, 2019 (Wednesday)</u> "Forgotten Christmas Stories, Remembered – Mary Jane Holmes" (Presenters: Mr. Christopher Albrecht & Brockport Students) Mary Jane Holmes wrote the "Christmas Font." However, she wrote many other Christmas stories that were published in her book, Christmas Stories. You will be treated to a brief history of authoress, Mary Jane Holmes, and wonderful evening of hearing Christmas stories published by her in 1884.

January 15, 2020 (Wednesday) "Helen Hastings, Rediscovered" (Presenter: Mrs. Sarah Hart) Helen Hastings was a Brockport resident in the early 1900's. She and current Brockport resident, Sarah Hart, are two artists who trained in the same unique "Sight-Size" method used in classical oil painting for centuries. Their studies took place at a great distance from each other in the world. They were also far apart in time by nearly a century. In that interim, Sight-Size came close to vanishing when it was rejected by the art world due to modern influences at the turn of the 20th century. Hart "met" Hastings recently through her art work which was discovered hidden in an attic trunk in Hastings' former home on State Street. With Hart's ongoing examining and explaining the work, the hidden Hastings treasure may become an enhancement to understanding the Sight-Size method, now revived.

February 20, 2020 (Thursday) "HELLMIRA: The Union's Most Infamous POW Camp of the Civil War" (Presenter: Mr. Derek Maxfield) Long called by some the "Andersonville of the North," the prisoner of war camp in Elmira, New York, is remembered as the most notorious of all Union-run POW camps. It existed for only a year—from the summer of 1864 to July 1865—but in that time, and for long after, it became darkly emblematic of man's inhumanity to man. Confederate prisoners called it "Hellmira."

March 19, 2020 (Thursday) "Naturalist, Artist, Taxidermist: The Many Talents of David Bruce" (Presenter: Mrs. Chris Hunt & Dr. Rozenn Bailleul-LeSuer) David Bruce (1833-1903), originally from Scotland, settled in Brockport in the late 1870s. He is best known as a taxidermist - the Morgan-Manning House owns several of the bird displays he prepared. However, he was also a renowned naturalist and an accomplished artist. He not only did the interior decorating of St Luke's church but also painted murals, which still adorn several homes in Sweden, Brockport, and Clarkson. During this program, Chris Hunt will tell us how she rediscovered some of David Bruce's masterpieces in her home, at the White Farm.

April 15, 2020 (Wednesday) "Henry Seldon, the Political Leader" (Presenter: Dr. William Andrews) Henry R. Selden, who lived in Clarkson, 1830-47, and, in Brockport, 1847-54, was an abolitionist, a major and highly-principled politician, and probably the area's leading attorney. He represented Susan B. Anthony when she was arrested for voting in 1872.

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
